EDITING

I served as Advisory Editor of The Irish Americans, a forty-two volume series published by Arno Press (New York Times), 1976.

Along with Emmet Larkin, I was coeditor of the Reprints in Irish Studies published by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology Press and the University of Chicago Press for the American Committee for Irish Studies.

I served on the editorial board of Ethnicity and The New History of Ireland and now serve on the editorial boards of the University of Illinois Press's Chicago Ethnic Series, The Recorder, and The Multicultural Review.

PAPERS READ

I have presented papers to a large number of academic conferences, including The American Historical Association, The Irish Historical Society, The American Conference for Irish Studies, The Conference on British Studies, The American Catholic Historical Association, and The Modern Language Association.

TEACHING

In every college and university where I have been a faculty member I have earned the reputation of excellent teacher, lecturing classes with hundreds of students in Western Civilization, and smaller groups in Modern European, British, Irish, and Irish-American history; and conducting undergraduate honors and graduate seminars and tutorials. Graduating seniors at Loyola usually have listed me as one of the best teachers they experienced in their four years at the university. I have directed the research of a number of Loyola graduate students, including seven Ph.D.'s. With one exception, every M.A. and Ph.D. student who has worked with me has published. Four of my Ph.D. 's have books in print or in press, and I expect similar results from two others. I also helped direct the research efforts of two successful Ph.D. candidates at Marquette University. At present, I am serving on the committee of a University of Chicago candidate for the Ph.D.

OFFICES HELD

Along with Emmet Larkin and Gilbert Cahill I co-founded The American Conference for Irish Studies (originally the American Committee for Irish Studies), an inter-disciplinary organization of about 1600 members that includes scholars in history, literature, Celtic Studies, anthropology, sociology, political science, and the fine arts. For eight years I served as the first Secretary of ACIS, as its President from 1976 and 1979, and as a member of the Executive Committee, 1960-81, and 1984-87. From 1984 to 1987 I was President of the Midwest Regional branch of ACIS. In addition, I have served as Second and First Vice-President of the American Catholic Historical Association and President from 1990 to 1991.

RADIO AND TELEVISION

Over the years I have discussed Ireland and Irish America on ABC, CBS, and NBC television in Chicago, Radio Eireann and a number of radio stations in Chicago and on National Public Broadcasting. I was one of five historians, and the only American, to appear on Thames TV's production of The Troubles, a six part documentary on Northern Ireland. It first aired in 1981. I appeared on the 1995 Radharc Films, Blackrock, County Dublin Stories From Irish America on RTE Dublin. I am featured in a Lennon Documentaries six part documentary on Irish America that appeared on PBS in the autumn of 1997.
